INCEPTION

"A photograph is not just the result of an encounter between an event and a photographer: picture-taking is an event in itself, and one with ever more peremptory rights – to interfere with, to invade, or to ignore whatever is going on. Our very sense of situation is now articulated by the camera's interventions." (Susan Sontag – On Photography)

Photography, as we know it today, has its origins in France in the late 1830s. Many people believed that photography could not be art, because it was the product of a machine rather than of human creativity. But time and people have proven the opposite.

Today, we learn to see ourselves photographically and photography is one of the principal means of experiencing something. Cameras have become omnipresent, which makes a convincing case for the idea that time consists of singular events worth photographing. This way, even after the event has ended, something else can be brought into the world: the photograph. It gives a sort of immortality and significance to the event. This is a nostalgic time we live in and photographs actively promote nostalgia, one of the most addictive feelings.

As an art form, photography is both emotionally provoking and visually stimulating. Every photographer invites its viewers to connect to their work as they tell a story to elicit a certain response.

SENSES

The artist behind the

camera searches for inspiration everywhere around: it could be the light falling on a scene, the look in someone's eyes, the time of day or the time of year. From small details, like the touch of a hand or the kiss between two strangers, to complex sequences, like a very vivid dialogue or an astonishing landscape. Whatever it is, it grants us the ability to share a vision with the world. Starting as artists of an urban sensibility, photographers claim some of their muses to be bold color, unique styles, the interplay of light and shadow, simplicity and novelty, unconventional designs, street life and human nature or the human form.

"Photography is the only language understood in all parts of the world and, bridging all nations and cultures, it links together the family of man. Independent of political influence where people are free - it reflects truthfully life and events, allows us to share in the hopes and despair of others, and illuminates political and social conditions. 

Light is the source of all life on earth. If we go to the roots of the word we find that photography literally means drawing with light, which derives from the Greek phos, meaning light, and graphis, meaning drawing.

SHADOW

As there can be no vin without yang, photography also must embrace the duality of both light and shadow. Most of the time. photographers tend to see and seek the light. When it is impossible to see the effects of light, it might be easier to look at the shadows. There are so many things you may discover just by studying the shadows in a photograph like, for instance, the mood of an image. A dramatic photograph uses the light and shadow in the most creative ways. There are bad shadows and there are good shadows. It is the latter that add dynamic, direction, impact and even mood. They result from a strong directional light source from any side lighting.

The play of light and shadow, of lines and shapes. of people and nature. Photography creates unique stories on different subjects. Looking for the best angle. the author finds millions of universes hidden behind one shot. Every story has a beginning... The railway is in use daily, servicing the sawmills and wood industry in Vișeu de Sus village.









The Iaşi Palace of Culture is a masterpiece of early 20th century NeoGothic flamboyant architecture and an iconic building located in the city of Iaşi, Romania. The palace is one of the biggest buildings in the entire country, covering an area of 34,236 sqm.
